Dear Parents, Guardians and Organizations:

We hope this finds you well. As you may know, Camp Kindle is a non-profit organization that provides a cost-free summer camp for youth infected with and affected by HIV and AIDS. This camp offers a medically and emotionally supportive environment for each participant. Our program helps these children find positive meaning in their lives by making friends, having fun, and sharing hopes with others confronting similar circumstances. Additionally, the camp helps primary caregivers by providing respite and necessary time for themselves. This traditional summer camping experience has an emphasis on leadership, community and team building. We believe that every camper learns and grows at Camp Kindle. Eva Payne established Camp Kindle in 1998. Camp Kindle has developed into a strong organization that is heading into its 14th summer. Eligibility Criteria:

1. All youth must be between the ages of 7 and 15 by the first day of camp.
2. All youth must be either living with HIV/AIDS (the child has HIV or AIDS) or someone in the child's household must be living with HIV/AIDS (a parent, guardian, sibling or other family member that lives with the child/children). Or the child/children may have lost a parent or sibling to this disease.
3. All participants must have some level of understanding as to why they may be invited to attend Camp Kindle. Meaning, ALL campers must either know his/her own HIV/AIDS diagnosis or the diagnosis of a family member who is living with HIV/AIDS. Staff members may raise and/or discuss the subject of HIV/AIDS in a variety of workshops and/or activities throughout the week at Camp Kindle. Children are not required to speak openly about their feelings or knowledge of HIV/AIDS.
4. Campers need to reside in the Central United States for the Nebraska Session or the Western United States for the California session.

* Individuals age 16, 17 and 18 can contact us for an application to participate in the "Counselors In Training" or CIT program. CIT's do not need to be directly affected by HIV/AIDS.

Forms and Registration:

Pre-Registration forms will continue to be accepted. All applicants will remain confidential. We will be accepting up to 100 youth per summer session. Once the Pre-Registration Form is sent in, reviewed and accepted, a confirmation packet will be sent out with additional release and medical forms.

§ AN INTRODUCTION TO CAMP KINDLE

Since our inception in 1998, Camp Kindle has served over 1,200 young people infected with and affected by HIV and AIDS. Camp Kindle will offer this service again in 2012.

The philosophy of Camp Kindle is to offer a medically and emotionally supportive environment with an exciting camping program geared to the age, interest and ability of our campers. This involves learning new skills; making new friends; and participating in programs such as boating, swimming, arts and crafts, field and water sports, dance, fishing, nature appreciation and theatre. We also offer evening programs that include campfires, a dance, carnival, wacky camp Olympics and other special entertainment. In addition to all of this, our Nurse Practitioner heads up a workshop on health education and its importance.

Throughout the week we focus on recognizing and building on positive character traits such as Respect, Honestly, Citizenship and Caring. We also challenge our campers to try new things as well as make and reach their goals both during camp and throughout the year.

Our Mission is to improve the quality of life for young people infected with and affected by HIV and AIDS.

§ WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR CAMP KINDLE?

Young People infected and affected by HIV/AIDS between the ages of 7-15 by the first day of camp. Campers 16-18 can apply for our Counselor In Training Program (please contact for application). Campers may be infected with HIV, in various stages of the disease progression, have or had infected siblings, children, parent or primary caregiver. Campers should reside in the Central United States or California. Camp Kindle participants come from diverse racial/ethnic, socioeconomic, and religious backgrounds. Campers should be aware they or someone in their family is/was infected with HIV.

▪ WHEN AND WHERE IS CAMP KINDLE?

This summer Camp Kindle will hold its annual camping programs in Nebraska and California. Our Midwest session is held in Bellevue, Nebraska at Gene Epply Camp. This session will be held the first week of August. Camp Kindle will also be hosting our annual camp in Southern California for those young people who reside in the Western United States. This session will be held in July in Frasier Park, California at Camp Condor.

▪ WHO ARE THE STAFF?

The majority of Camp Kindle's volunteer summer staff are college/university students or recent graduates studying or working in areas related to services for youth or the medical field. There is a staff to camper ratio of 1:3. All of our staff are at least 18 years of age. They have all successfully completed an extensive application, an interview, a background check and 40 hours of training.

Camp Kindle has at least (2) two Registered Nurses on site 24 hours a day who run the camp infirmary. Our Nurses have extensive backgrounds in HIV and AIDS care. In addition, there is a Physician on call 24 hours a day. Camp Kindle has (2) two Mental Health Professional on site to handle any special needs of our campers.

▪ WHAT IS THE COST?

There is no cost for families to send their children to Camp Kindle. All costs are covered by grants and other private funding.

▪ HOW DO I APPLY?

- 1) Completely fill out the Pre-Registration Camper Application form for each potential participant and forward it to Camp Kindle.
- 2) Upon acceptance, Invitation Letters and Registration Packets will be sent to families and agencies.
- 3) Full Registration Packets will be due by May 15, 2012.
